Wednesday Night Races

The following is a recap of the June 23rd race:

The bay was calm and a light wind came from the south, so instead of the usual Boggy 1, Grass Lake was our mark. Naturally, pre-race mark coordination between the skippers was handled smoothly and professionally... Good thing it was also conducted verbally, rather than over VHF on channel 16. Otherwise, the Coast Guard might've boarded the whole fleet...

The set of the line was more or less correct, with no favored end. And this week, the race committee managed to establish the line with more than a few seconds remaining before the starting sequence. It may have helped not having to untangle a Gordian Knot in the pin rode. (Incidentally, the race committee would like to extend kudos to last week's race committee for the seaman-like, figure-eight coil used to stow the pin rode...very professional).

Pre-race maneuvering was leisurely and afforded the skippers an opportunity to run the line and consult with the race committee on important issues...

The fleets' tacticians and helm were at the top of their games as this starting sequence was something to behold...for the most part, that is... However, there were some perfect starts. Maverick crossed the line, at speed, at precisely 6:00:00, with Avocet pressing hard from leeward at 6:00:01. They were followed quickly by Ice Bear, Sam Kam III and Kahlua.

More than a minute later, Head High crossed the line. The race committee had been hoping to see the surgically-precise, Head High start which is Chad's hallmark. This week, not so much. Perhaps the presence of the Admiral caused some type of performance anxiety...

But, not this time. Channeling Dennis Connor, Linda "Get 'Er Done Right" Wright was at tactician and helm. And she was working the polars like an Eskimo on crack. After a textbook jibe to starboard, Maverick accelerated and charged the windward Kahlua, closing faster than a starving greyhound after a three-legged rabbit. Kahlua's luck ran out just short of the line and Maverick passed with a split second to spare. The race committee was delighted by both the exciting sprint and Mickey's warm and sportsmanlike congratulations to Maverick.

Head High and Leterip were both DNF, and judging by their tardy returns, the race committee believed that they also DNGAS.

In the race committee's view, it was Maverick's race. Perfect start. First to the mark. Beautiful finish.
