It could've been a perfect day for Wednesday Night Racing. The conditions were nothing at all like the 48 knots of gusty wind, driving rain and steep chop from last week's race. The bay was calm and a light breeze came from the

south. Our mark at Grass Lake was practically visible from the starting line. Everything pointed to an easy, leisurely afternoon regatta...maybe next time.

The starting line was broad and perpendicular to the mark. This much was accomplished before the passengers on Committee Boat Diamond had the chance to gel into that Jackalope of human cooperative effort – A Committee. Yes, Dear Racers, this week the Race Committee was actually a "committee", consisting of four adults and three minor children. The Race Committee Chair highly recommends for future service all three of the minor children. They were quick, eager, largely silent, compliant, cheerful, and perhaps most satisfyingly, they were unencumbered by either a knowledge of racing rules or wristwatches of their own. Their adult guardians, not so much.

While the Race Committee caucused, the fleet formed and used their pre-race maneuvering time to tune their yachts as their skippers saw fit. Avocet and Kahlua focused on sails and rigging, while Iwalani concentrated on the in-mast furling system. Not to be outdone by Iwalani's thoroughness, Let 'Er Rip, tuned up her engine. At least that was the Committee Chair's presumption. Why else would she be under power throughout the starting sequence. But, perhaps the most ambitious tuning effort was turned by Ryan "Ninja Turtle" Hinely, who conducted a complete inspection of the Seafood's hull, keel and rudder assembly. I suppose true champions know that it's all about the wetted surface.

The fleet had a wider mix of racers than the Race Committee has seen in some time – from the Wavelength 24, Avocet, to the Sunfish, Seafood. It made for an exciting start. At precisely 6:00:00 (that's 24:00:20, Zulu, for you military types), the "Class" flag came down with Seafood less than a boat length from the line. But, Kahlua was first across at 6:00:03, followed quickly by Maverick and Avocet. Not to be outdone by the bigger yachts, Ryan drove Seafood hard and made it across the starting line in only another three minutes and 57 seconds. Then came Iwalani at 6:12:40, and several refreshments later, Let 'Er Rip, at 7:01:50. Perhaps these last two had aboard committees of their own ...

Maverick was first to the mark, but since they did not finish, first to the mark honors went to Avocet. Bottom half honors go to Ryan "Ninja Turtle" Hinely, who crossed the line at 6:43:01. Next came Avocet at 7:03:20 and Kahlua at 7:09:02. All of whom were greeted in the water by Committee Member #2, who swam out to each in turn, perhaps by that point needing a "Protest" flag of his own...
