In honor of the upcoming 50th anniversary, here is a re-print the write up for the first regatta held by the Bayou Sailing Club, today's Bluewater Bay Sailing Club. Don't forget, the BBSC Shipstore is offering 50th shirts and hats

First REGATTA

The first Regatta of the newly formed Bayou Sailing Club was held on **September 26th, 1965**. 10 entries.

Captains briefing was held at 1:30p.m. The race stared at 2:25 p.m.

First to finish: Jack Manning, Lightning
Second: Dan Morrison, Rhodes 19
Third: Dave Howard, Trimaran N 477

Winner corrected time: Bob Dietz, Knockabout

It was decided the next Club race would be held on Sunday October 10, 1965.

Historical Notes: During the week prior to the first race following the organizational meeting the committees went to work, this being a notably austere venture from the outset, skill and cunning was substituted for money at every turn. Jack Manning constructed course markers using old automobile innertubes, bushel baskets and parachuterisers together with paintbuckets filled with cement for anchors, starting flags were constructed using sections of old gigghandles a piece of white bedsheet a blue bedspread and a scrap of orange cloth. The rules committee provided the formula, sailing rules and purpose of the club plus other forms, secretarial services donated to the Club by the Valparaiso State Bank. A map of the Bayou expertly drawn by Walt Ruckel, was among the forms, including exact locations of all Federal Channel Markers. Major Bob Dietz was able to cleverly sneak two notices past the desk of Nancy Kenaston of the Playground Daily News through the Eglin I.O. As a reserve measure he also spoke over the Station W.F.T.W. having told the staff he would announce an important new project in the Fort Walton Beach Area. Race Day, feeling the urgency of the situation Dan Morrison contacted the committee heads at 1:30 on the morning of the race to be sure they were still coming. Other details of the races organization were left to be done at a more appropriate time. Maj. McCraney graciously offered the services of his powerboat for setting out the coursemarkers,

feeling a slower boat would cause unacceptable dilution of good whiskey due to melting ice in drinks left on shore. His aid in this matter

was solicited by Tom

Bell and was greatly appreciated. A

fine start was made by Jack Manning at which time he took the lead in the race and never lost it. Just prior to the start while jibing to the mark Tom Bell broke his tiller and retired. Carl Van Wegern after being second across the line and sailing the best race on corrected time disqualified himself for touching a mark. Spinnakers ginpoles and other marks of preparation were in evidence throughout the fleet on each downwind leg, showing careful preparation on the part of many skippers. The ten boats participating in the first race were all sailed quite well, there only being 13 minutes separating the first and last on corrected time. All participants spontaneously expressed their appreciation for this chance to participate in sailboat racing and felt the clubs approach to sailing competition in this area a correct one. Club members felt this first regatta to have been successful and the promise for further growth of the club's activities a likely prospect.

Other Cruiser Activities

Here's a recap of Tom and Becky Kennedy's recent adventure.

Early June Becky and I on our 36' sailing cat, Per Diem, left Rocky Bayou Bridge area about 10 AM and about 1 hour into the bay saw and heard vicious lighting ahead. Turned around and anchored in Rocky Bayou until the weather cleared. Finally left and stayed our first night free in FWB city docks. You must call ahead to the city manager and get permission. There is free pump out and water but no power. The city manager, once notified, lets the police know so they can keep an eye out. The piers have public access so secure your boat if going to a restaurant. Following day motored to Lost Key Marina, located across from Big Lagoon. Nice marina, bathrooms, clubhouse, etc. Closed on Mondays. The cost is 1 dollar a foot per night which includes power and water. Next night we anchored on the west end of Dauphin Island. Good sandy bottom and 7' of water close to shore. Then finally on to the Biloxi Schooner Pier Complex. The Schooner pier is gated, has 2 65' working schooners that take people out several times a week. There has been a children's camp each week on the complex which is fun to watch them fish, crab, and learn to throw a cast net. The cost at the Schooner Pier is \$7/ ft per month and includes, electric, water, ice, free washer/dryer, and WiFi. The pier is located almost directly across from the Biloxi Yacht Club which, thru the GYCC, we have reciprocity so we use the BYC's salt water pool and restaurant frequently. We will be taking day trips or overnight to the barrier islands in the Mississippi Sound also. We miss you all and the summer activities however Biloxi has a lot to offer. Hello Sailors. The Ladybug Regatta was a big hit. Seven intrepid ladies took the helm of their respective sailboats and sailed a great race. The breeze was a little on the light side and the Bermuda style start kept some distance between the boats at the start.

For those unfamiliar with the Bermuda Start, the handicap is calculated before the start based on the known distance to be sailed. This is distinct from the normal starts in which all the boats of a given class start together, during the same starting sequence. The finish time of each boat is important. The PHRF handicap correction is applied to each boat based on their GYA

handicap value and the distance around the race course. After the corrections are applied, the corrected order of finish is determined. With the Bermuda Start, those same corrections are applied as delays in the start time for a given boat. Thus, most boats start across the line at a different time. Only boats with the same PHRF rating would start at the same

time. Unlike the normal start, the Bermuda race finish order is determined simply by the order in which the boats cross the line.

CAPTAIN REPORT In any case, the racing started with a each boat starting across the line at

their prescribed time. Only Kahlua jumped the gun by a few seconds and was required to restart. Everyone else crossed at varying times after their prescribed start time. You can see the interesting comparison of the best starts below; congrats to Push It Up for the best start!

In the end, the racing stayed fairly tight with Epiphany squeaking out the win, staying just ahead of Pandemonium. A special thanks goes to Brett Verzwyvelt and young crew for running a top-notch event.
